LEAVE OF ABSENCE DURING TERM TIME

As a school we discourage parents from taking pupils out of school, as it can disrupt continuity and places extra pressure on the pupil both before and after the absence, however carefully it is planned. Pupils attend school for 38 weeks per year, leaving 14 weeks to take a holiday. If a child is absent from school for a two week holiday, they will miss 5% of their education and we believe that this may have a negative effect on their level of achievement. Data indicates that an attendance figure below 95% means that children make significantly less progress than their peers.

Some parents may be under the impression that they have a legal entitlement to take their children out of school for up to 10 days at any time and that all they have to do is notify the school. The Governors and I feel it is important that we inform parents that this is not the case and that **there is no legal entitlement for pupils to have any time off school for a holiday.**

Please be aware that The Education (Pupil Registration)(England)(Amendment) Regulations 2013, which became law on 1st September 2013 state that Headteachers may not grant any leave of absence during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances. The Headteacher is also required to determine the number of school days a child can be away from school if leave is granted.

Unauthorised absence of 5 days or more may result in the issue of a Penalty Notice. Penalty Notices are issued by the Local Authority in accordance with Surrey County Council's Code of Conduct.

The Penalty Notice is £60, per child per parent/carers, if paid within 21 days or £120 if paid after 21 days but within 28 days. Failure to pay the Penalty Notice will result in you being served a summons to appear at the Magistrates Court.

The Headteacher will consider the reasons for the request carefully and will notify you of the decision.

Year 1





Year 4

This term has been an exciting and eventful term in Year 4!

We have been exploring Sound, looking in depth at the human ear drum (which we thought was gross!) We have had fun with Science on our Science Day. On Science day we explored which materials would melt ice the quickest and took part in an Ice race (it was very cold!)

In History we have been learning all about The Romans, we have been identifying what it was like in Roman times and learning about key Roman Emperors. We explored what it would have been like for The Romans living on Hadrian's wall, we used lots of maps to identify the location and discussed how we would have felt if we were there. We even had the chance to look at and touch some Roman artefacts from Chertsey Museum. We were fascinated that they were so old and asked lots of questions about what we thought the purpose of those items were.

In Geography we had lots of fun learning about Rivers and The Water cycle. We even learnt a Water cycle rap and created our own examples for homework. We learnt lots of new vocabulary and identified and explored Rivers all around the UK. We even looked at famous rivers such as 'The River Nile' and the 'Amazon River.'

In English we have been writing about 'The Selfish Giant' and we even had the opportunity to write our own stories. We had lots of fun using our imagination to create new characters and events. In Maths we have been focusing on using a range of methods for addition and subtraction and learning our times tables. We have been practicing division methods and using our times tables to help us!

Year 5



It has been a busy spring term with many fun events!

Here we are at a workshop called 'Fantastic Fred' where we learnt the importance of looking after our mental health. We taught about the links between our physical and mental health. We learnt that FRED stood for Food – eating a balanced diet, Rest – getting enough sleep, Exercise – being active and Devices – managing time on digital devices. This was a great link to our PSHE lessons as we learnt that to have a healthy life, you need a healthy body and mind.



Science day was fantastic! In the whole school assembly, we learnt that every scientist demonstrate these skills: Curiosity, patience and observant. There was a carousel of activities in each class and we got to visit 3 classes. In this picture, we were examining the patterns of our fingerprints. From our research we found that most children had the loop or arch print and few had the whorl. We know that we share some similarities to animals, but we did not know that our fingerprints most closely resembles a...Koala and not Gorillas!

We had our History Wow Day which was planned by the children. They learnt how to write their names and a secret message using the Runes symbol. We were curious about what the Vikings used to eat and drink, so we baked Soda Bread with a drizzle of honey. Miss Nickless arranged for us to become archaeologists and study a range of artefacts from the local museum. We made axes/ swords or shields, which we later used for our dance battle to the song of Valhalla Calling.



Year 6


Westside Story at Magna Carta School

This term Year 1, Year 3 and Year 5 have had their History Wow Days. Year 1 were learning about “The Greatest Explorers”, Year 3 were learning about the “Bronze Age” and Year 5 were studying “The Vikings”. Year 3 and Year 5 were also very lucky to have the chance to have the history loan boxes from Chertsey Museum to explore some of the artefacts from that era. The teachers and children all went to lots of effort and all their History Wow Days were lots of fun! The children all demonstrated lots of good subject knowledge when talking about their topic this term. They were able to use some key vocabulary and are starting to use more chronological understanding and awareness. It has been lovely to see so many parents coming to view the children’s work at the end of the History Wow Days! 😊




NSPCC NUMBER DAY

On Friday 3rd February, the whole school took part in a NSPCC number day. Each class were given the opportunity to apply their Maths skills to everyday scenarios, whilst raising money for such a fantastic cause. Overall, we raised £170! We learnt that just £4 can connect a child to Childline - so think about how many children have been helped to get connected!

Year 4 & 6 Bikeability



This term, the Surrey Cycle Training Team came to Thorpe Lea to teach the Year 4 and 6 children how to ride their bikes safely. With Year 4, the children took part in learning Bikeability Level 1; practising their balance and control skills in the school playground. The instructors set up a few fun exercises and games so that the children could develop and practise skills such as riding one-handed, looking all around, stopping with control, sharing space, manoeuvring at low speed, using gears and turning with control.




Then, Year 6 completed their Bikeability Level 2 course; developing cycling skills to be able to safely cycle with traffic on the road. The instructors taught the children how to make good observations, choose the most suitable riding position in the road, communicate their intentions clearly, and follow traffic priorities - particularly at junctions.

Children in years 3-6 had the opportunity to have an online visit from 'Stephen Pass.' The children read the first chapter of his book 'Madge the Mermaid' and had the opportunity to learn about where his writing inspiration came from. The children also learnt a song for Madge and had great fun.

Children in EYFS and KS1 enjoyed a visit from the author 'Alison Simpson.' Alison talked about her inspiration for her books about 'Bodhi the Pirate Dog.' The children had the opportunity to ask lots of questions and Alison read her book to them.



After a successful World Book Day we had the travelling book fair. Children had the opportunity to use their World Book Day vouchers to buy a book available on the day. The children felt inspired to read new books and all classes had the opportunity to visit and look at the books on offer.

British Science Week
