#### LEAVE OF ABSENCE DURING TERM TIME

As a school we discourage parents from taking pupils out of school, as it can disrupt continuity and places extra pressure on the pupil both before and after the absence, however carefully it is planned. Pupils attend school for 38 weeks per year, leaving 14 weeks to take a holiday. If a child is absent from school for a two week holiday, they will miss 5% of their education and we believe that this may have a negative effect on their level of achievement. Data indicates that an attendance figure below 95% means that children make significantly less progress than their peers.

Some parents may be under the impression that they have a legal entitlement to take their children out of school for up to 10 days at any time and that all they have to do is notify the school. The Governors and I feel it is important that we inform parents that this is not the case and that there is no legal entitlement for pupils to have any time off school for a holiday.

Please be aware that The Education (Pupil Registration)(England)(Amendment) Regulations 2013, which became law on 1st September 2013 state that Headteachers may not grant any leave of absence during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances. The Headteacher is also required to determine the number of school days a child can be away from school if leave is granted.

Unauthorised absence of 5 days or more may result in the issue of a Penalty Notice. Penalty Notices are issued by the Local Authority in accordance with Surrey County Council's Code of Conduct.

The Penalty Notice is £60, per child per parent/carer, if paid within 21 days or £120 if paid after 21 days but within 28 days. Failure to pay the Penalty Notice will result in you being served a summons to appear at the Magistrates Court.

The Headteacher will consider the reasons for the request carefully and will notify you of the decision.

Amber in Reception got a golden ticket for understanding to use exclamation marks to read with super expression!


Saxon in Reception got a golden ticket for playing in his first football match and scoring a goal.

## **Reception**

It has been a wonderfully busy Autumn term as usual for us here in Reception, however we had the help of some lovely teachers to help settle us in whilst Miss Nickless was poorly! They looked after us very well! Right from the beginning the children had been joining in with whole school assemblies and even singing practise on Wednesdays! The children have been busy learning the rules of the classroom and playground, building friendships and learning to listen and respond to our friends and adults. On top of that, we have enjoyed a Halloween disco, Children in Need, Pyjama

Day, our school Christmas dinner and writing and sending our letters to Santa as a class! We have lots more exciting things coming up next term and we cannot wait to come back to school and start our learning after the Holidays!







## Year 1

In September, Year 1 went on an imaginative adventure with Drama4all, which including travelling to a far off land, searching through old castles and fighting off dangerous witches all in order to help a brave knight recover his sword. We had so much fun exploring cold artic areas, crossing flimsy bridges over boiling hot lava and swimming though damp grimy swamps.





Autumn Term in Year 2 has been extremely busy with many exciting learning opportunities taking place. In maths, they have been counting to 100 forwards and backwards. They are secure with their place value knowledge and understand that two digit numbers are made up of 10s and 1s. The children can add two 2 digit numbers, they can skip count in 2s, 3s, 5s and 10s as well as use positional language. We have used many manipulatives to help with our understanding of maths and children have also used clocks and money. Most of our early morning activities are linked to maths too as well as a daily maths session after lunch. In English, we have focussed on four books: The Bear Under the Stairs, The Journey Home, Great Fire of London and Wolves. Children have completed some amazing writing over the term and have been given many different writing opportunities such as letters, stories, non-

chronological reports, posters and lists.













In Science, the children have learnt about habitats and microhabitats. We looked at hot, dry habitats such as deserts and the animals that you find in those environments. We also looked at a humid, wet and soggy rainforest. The children then moved onto the science topic of "changing materials" which linked well with The Great Fire of London and our DT. They carried out many investigations to find out which materials were waterproof and which were absorbent. We carried out tests to try and find out the material with the most elasticity. We learned about the various properties of materials and in DT they had to test the stability of structures and the materials they were using. This was a great cross-curricular activity with maths as they were testing the strength of cuboids and cylinders. Many teamwork opportunities have been offered too as this helps to support their communication of ideas, their confidence and creativity as well as their social skills in terms of sharing, helping each other achieve a common goal and listening.

In computing, the children have been learning to communicate via email. They can attach documents and know how to share learning to the bulletin board. The handwriting practise continues weekly and noticeable improvement is evident. In Autumn 2, the children have been practising the Nativity. They have auditioned, made props and sung their hearts out.





What a term it has been in Year 3! We have all thoroughly enjoyed our learning and the fun activities we have been doing. We have been looking at; Length in Maths, the Stone Age in History, Rocks in Science, Internet Safety in Computing and we have been making our own masks in DT!

We also learnt about Alma Thomas in Art. We dedicated a whole afternoon to recreate her famous artwork and learnt all about her life.

Lastly, we have had SO much fun learning the songs for the Christmas Concert (our class song especially). We have some very talented singers in this class!













Year 4 have had a fantastic day dress up and learning about the Egyptians. Children in Year 4 had the opportunity to bring their learning to life, we explored artefacts from Chertsey Museum, created our own 3D pyramids and designed and painted a Tutankhamun mask. We also had lots of fun learning some Egyptian dance and writing messages in Hieroglyphics.

A brilliant day had by all!





## Year 5 & 6 STEAM Trip

In the beginning of Autumn term, Years 5 and 6 visited Thorpe Park for an educational STEAM fair. We completed many fascinating and informative workshops that required us to work as a team. It was very rewarding because depending on how many workshops we completed we would earn a free pass on a ride!

When we arrived, we were greeted by the loud whirring noise of the RAF helicopter circling above our heads. This was just the beginning of an exciting trip! After leaving the coach and making our way to the entrance of the park, we were handed ear plugs but none of us knew why. Ahead of us we saw crowds gathered around waiting for something, then suddenly, a loud whoosing sound followed by a figure blasted up into the air and spun around side to side. It was a man on a jet pack! We were cheering! We have never seen anything like this before!

As we entered the park, we listened to the marching band play. They marched all the way through the park throughout the day! It was cool to see an orchestra!

We really enjoyed the practical workshop called 'The Big Bugzi' where we used tools and screws to build a wheelchair for children with a physical disability. The children each took turns to attach parts such as the wheels to the base of the wheelchair and use the drill to tighten the screws — it was very loud! It was even more amazing to see a disabled child using the wheelchair that the children were helping to build! Here are some pictures to show the work we did.







After collecting enough stamps from the activities all over the park, we could enjoy some of the amazing rides! Mrs Green's favourite ride was the teacup.



All around the park were amazing workshops, including a small petting zoo where we could feed the animals and pet them.



Almost at the end of the day, we were tired from all the walking and hard work we had done. It was nice to sit and watch a Sports Science show to end our trip with. Lexi, in Year 5 bravely volunteered to stand on stage with a child from another school to show her balancing skills. We learnt that you could not stand back to back and touch your toes. The most exciting part of the show was when the children nominated a teacher from the audience (thankfully not our teachers although our children did beg!) to sit on 100, sharp pointy nails. It was painful to watch but she managed it!



Overall, we had the best start to Years 5 and 6 and we would really love to do this again!

#### **Remembrance Day Artwork**

On November 11<sup>th</sup>, Year 6 were thinking about all the soldiers that dedicated their lives in service. They created these beautiful Remembrance pieces of art of soldiers mourning their lost comrades using charcoal. We then displayed them around the classroom so that we can continue to remember those who fought and died for us.









## **Citizenship Trip at Thorpe Park**

Year 6 had an amazing time visiting Thorpe Park to learn about fire, water, first aid and personal safety. At the first aid station, the children learnt how to move a person into the recovery position, learning a new rhyme to help them remember (Please miss, I have a toothache and I need a wee wee).

Next, the children learnt how to keep their bodies safe and healthy by understanding which sugars are bad, and how much sugar they are allowed each day (Can you believe it's only seven sugar cubes)

Then, the police taught the children all about stranger danger. They spoke about the importance of them telling strangers no, and making sure they do not go off with people they do not know. The police then spoke to the children about what they could do if a stranger approaches them and how they can help themselves.

The next stop was speaking with the fire brigade about fire safety. They reminded the children not to leave candles unattended, and how to use extension cables safely. Transport for London came to teach the children how to cross railway crossings safely, and how to be safe on a train platform. The RLNI (Royal National Lifeboat Institute) then taught the children how to be safe around water and what risks they need to look out for.

Finally, the children learnt about road and bike safety from the police. They explored where and when to cross the road; making sure they are not on their phones or listening to music. They also looked at how important it is to be seen when riding bikes in the dark. Remember; stay bright to save your life!

#### **Festival of Diwali**

On Monday 17<sup>th</sup> October, the entire school came together to learn and celebrate the festival of Diwali. Parents, staff and some children dressed up to mark the festivity. This year, the children took part in acting out the Diwali Story and presented to the whole school, some of our parents who celebrate Diwali and to the members of the Church. We all then took part in the 'puja' which was performed by one of the parents. The children and staff all enjoyed the traditional food kindly provided by our parents.
